#### **DWIGHT'39**



We learned of the passing of Ann Coulter "Colti" Wiss from her son Frederick "Freddie" Wiss and he shared her obituary:

"Ann Coulter Wiss passed away December 29, 2021, nine days shy of 100. She grew up in Burlington, NC and Greensboro, NC. Attending Dwight for two years, she was one of two who were not from New Jersey or New York of the twenty girls in her class.

Her fond memories of Dwight included the proximity to New York City, attending the 1939 New York World's Fair, and skating at the Coffins house in the winter. She was voted "The Most Artistic" by her class. She went on to Smith College, but left after two years to return to NYC, attending Arts Students League and the New Art School. In 1943, she worked for Grumman Aircraft in the war effort and at the end of the year married Norman F Wiss Jr., who was then sent overseas for two years. After the war, they settled in Livingston, NJ and then Short Hills, NJ. Through the years she pursued many activities and was a leader of a variety of organizations.

In the 70s and 80s, she volunteered as a seamstress at the Costume Institute at the Metropolitan Museum of Art. In the 70s, she began forty years of volunteering at the gardens at Rutgers University and later became a certified Master Gardener. She is survived by her three children, Cathy (Chris), Don and Freddie (Cathleen) and three grandchildren, Sarah, Thomas and Margaret."

#### **DWIGHT'50**



We received the sad news that Mary O'Connor Montgomery (pictured above with her husband Bob at the Palm Beach Opera gala in 2007) passed away on February 9, 2022. Her obituary was published by the *Palm Beach Daily News* on February 25, 2022:

"Mary Montgomery, a discerning but generous patroness of the arts during her 60-plus years as a Palm Beach resident, died Wednesday, Feb. 9, 2022, after a long battle with dementia. She was 91 years old and the widow of late powerhouse attorney Robert Montgomery, who won an \$11 billion judgment against Big Tobacco in a groundbreaking lawsuit.

Born July 9, 1930 in Mobile, Alabama, Mary Le Merle McKenzie was the daughter of Roy William McKenzie and Mary Le Merle (nee Andrews) McKenzie. She was a co-ed at the University of Alabama when she met an upperclassman from Birmingham named Bob Montgomery, who would become her husband. After Mr. Montgomery's post-college military service was up, he decided to use his GI Bill to go to law school full time. His young wife worked as a secretary in a psychiatric hospital to keep them afloat.

"Those were some tough times," Mr. Montgomery would say later in an interview. "But we managed." (Continued next page.) The couple moved to Palm Beach in the early 1960s and became active in charity, particularly those relating to arts and culture. The Palm Beach Opera was a particular favorite, receiving both financial and administrative support from the pair, both of whom served on the board.

"All of us at Palm Beach Opera are deeply saddened to learn of the passing of Mary Montgomery," said David Walker, general and artistic director of the Palm Beach Opera. "Mary, and her late husband Robert, were very involved and supportive of the opera for many years, with Robert having been the company's board chairman for 25 years, and Mary then joining the board after his passing in 2008. Mary also joined the board of the Palm Beach Opera Guild in 1984, and both she and Robert were very involved in the Palm Beach Opera Vocal Competition. Mary was also one of the founders and underwriters of the company's annual Opera at the Waterfront concerts.

"The company couldn't be where it is today without the incredible, longtime support and leadership of both Robert and Mary, and we will forever miss Mary's incredible charm, grace, wonderful spirit, commitment and passion for opera." Another favorite was the Armory Art Center, which was seeded through a generous gift from the Montgomerys. "Mary Montgomery and her husband, Robert, were the foundation in establishing the Armory Arts Center as a visual, art education, and exhibit space for the community," said Tom Pearson, CEO of the Armory Art Center, "she was a true patron of the armory and of the arts." Mrs. Montgomery was the mother of a son, who died in 1992, and a daughter, who survives her.""

"Wilkin Evans Thomas, Jr., age 85, of Wilmington, DE passed away on August 2, 2021. Wilk was born in Englewood, NJ to Wilkin and Margaret Thomas. He graduated from Dwight-Englewood School in Englewood, NJ. Following high school, Wilk graduated Cum Laude from Williams College with a degree in physics and was a member of the Phi Beta Kappa fraternity. He later attended Yale University

for graduate studies in physics. Wilk joined the US Bureau of Standards in Gaithersburg, MD and then joined the scientific staff of E.I. DuPont De Nemours and Company Experimental Station in Wilmington, DE. He earned his JD from University of Maryland School of Law in Baltimore, MD and joined DuPont's Legal Department, later heading up their Asia Pacific Law Division in Tokyo, Japan just prior to retiring.

Wilk was predeceased by his beloved wife of 50 years, Lavinia Burwell Hillsman, III of Teaneck, NJ. Some of his greatest joys were the years they lived in Tokyo, Japan and when they traveled extensively throughout the world. He was a member of the Wilmington Country Club where he enjoyed playing golf. He was an avid reader, lover of the NY Times crossword puzzles and an ardent follower of financial markets.

Most of all, his family meant the world to him. Wilk is survived by his three children, their spouses and seven grandchildren: Doug Thomas and Chris Conn, PhD (Cameron and Connor) from Ellicott City, MD; Rob and Ann Marie Thomas (Forrest, Ashley Ann, and Chandler) from Hockessin, DE; and Meg and Alan Quaintance (Morgan and Tyler) from Hockessin, DE. He is also survived by his sister-in-law, Sally Turnbull Hillsman, PhD from Washington, D.C."

Of late, in his grandfatherly years, the spectacle of his unbridled happiness with his grandchildren, each in their own rite, was absolutely beautiful and confirming of the hopeful, positive life view he insisted upon.

Born in New York City and raised in Englewood, NJ, son and nephew to a paternal family of physicians and a maternal force of nature, Dad's intended path to medical school derailed auspiciously when he parlayed a modest graduation gift into a then tidy sum in the market. Thus encouraged, he opted for a position with a small Wall Street firm, Stevens, Rothschild & Co. Through an exceptional cascade of happenstance, the kind face of fate placed in his way the love of his life, Shelden, to whom his devotion, while distinctly of his own design and sort, was boundless. Their caring for each other through forty-five years was unfailing and their enjoyment of each other never diminished. It is the most sacred undertaking of his surviving family to surround Shelden in this hardest of times with the love and care Dad would have asked. There is solace in the fact that Dad enjoyed a strong faith his entire life. Not a dogmatic or doctrinal one but a carefully examined, prolifically read, enthusiastically practiced, and grinningly shared one. His very curious, frequently proclaimed enthusiasm for the Prodigal Son story chafed his two sons by implication but, taken fairly, epitomized the vastly caring and forgiving nature with which Dad exercised his faith. In his final moment, if he had

an instant to assess, Dad would have been deeply comforted and at peace through his trust in God.

There is no reason not to suppose that the warm light that was Dad is dispersed now into the larger light of our universe and that any time you are warmed by that universal light, a little part of it is Dad warming you as he always hoped to do, while with us, whenever he smiled at you."

#### **DWIGHT'64**

In The New York Times, an article was published on July 6, 2022, entitled, Lesley Gore's Archive, Open to All, Arrives at the New York Public Library. Here is an excerpt from the article:

"As a teenage singer in the 1960s who fit the all-American girl mold, Lesley Gore may have seemed like an unlikely figure to carve out a lasting legacy of feminist resilience and independence. The New York Public Library for the Performing Arts has now made the musician's archive available for anyone interested in her artistic evolution, giving fans a chance to browse through notated music sheets and an unfinished memoir.

Lois Sasson, Gore's partner for more than 30 years, began working with the library in February 2016, sifting through storage boxes and cataloging each object with help from the singer's family and friends. Sasson emphasized that the collection should remain free to the public and housed in New York, where Gore lived, said Jessica Wood, the assistant curator of music and recorded sound at the Library for the Performing Arts. Gore died of lung cancer in 2015. Sasson, a fierce defender of women's and gay rights, died from COVID-19 in 2020.

The archive, which contains scrapbooks, newspaper clippings, fan club files, music theory books, a birthday invitation, family photographs and album covers, was first made available on May 31, and all printed and written works can be examined on request. The library is still working to digitize the audio and movie image recordings that document Gore's rehearsals, performances and television appearances, as well as visual works like a 1968 Robert F. Kennedy ad campaign."

#### **ESB** '69

Peter Balakian delivered the keynote address at the Capitol Hill Commemoration of the Armenian Genocide on April 28, 2022. As reported by the Armenian National Committee of America, this ceremony was the first such in-person gathering since the US Congress and President fully and formally recognized this crime. We received the sad news of the passing of Gordon G. Glidden, brother of Deborah Glidden Saliba Dwight '63, John Glidden ESB '65 and Jim Glidden ESB '68, on October 6, 2021:

"Gordon G. Glidden of Huntington Woods, Michigan and Sugar Springs, Michigan died October 6, 2021 after a long illness. He was 65. Gordon was born in New York on August 10, 1956 to Rae Petigrue Glidden and John C. Glidden. He grew up in Englewood, New Jersey, where he attended the Englewood Public Schools and the Englewood School for Boys before attending the Kent School in Kent, CT, where he graduated in 1974. He started playing hockey at the Englewood Field Club at a young age, and played throughout high school and college. Mr. Glidden graduated from Union College, Schenectady, NY in 1978 with a degree in Civil Engineering. During his senior year at Union, while captain of the Junior Varsity Hockey team, the entire Varsity team resigned in a dispute with the college. Glidden found himself now captain of the Varsity of a Division I hockey team with a ragtag squad. His team lost 19 out of 19 games, scored a total of one goal, and yet he determined that the team would show up for every minute of every game, which they did. After college, he began his engineering career at Turner Construction Corporation and was assigned to their Columbus, Ohio office.

In 1985 he relocated to Turner's Detroit office establishing his construction expertise as a Cost Engineer. In 2003 Gordon left the Construction Industry and used his knowledge of construction and real estate to establish himself in the home inspection business with the firm of US Inspect, Inc. In 2014, he established his own Firm, Inland Lakes Home Inspection Services Inc., concentrating in both the Detroit area and Gladwin County in northern Michigan. After establishing his firm, Gordon became a licensed Drone Pilot and was able to utilize his skills in enhancing his home inspection business. He was a longtime member of the American Society of Home Inspectors and received several awards from the Real Estate Industry. In

Huntington Woods, Gordon readily volunteered his time and expertise with the Huntington Woods Planning Commission and was its Chairman for several years.

He was also a long-time member of the Detroit Chapter of the Optimists Club which is dedicated to helping disadvantaged youth. Gordon Glidden is survived by his siblings, Deborah Saliba of Orleans, Mass., John C. Glidden, Jr. of Closter, New Jersey and James LP Glidden of Holliston, Mass. ## WHAT IT TOOK TO WIN: A HISTORY OF THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY

The Democratic Party is the world's oldest mass political organization. Since its inception in the early nineteenth century, it has played a central role in defining American society, whether it was exercising power or contesting it. But what has the party stood for through the centuries, and
